News from TSAB

Since our last newsletter, TSAB has met face to face for the annual development session and virtually on 13th March and 17th April for scheduled Board meetings. Minutes are published on the TSAB Website retrospectively following sign-off at the next meeting.

TSAB Decision Support Guidance

The <u>TSAB Decision Support Guidance</u> has been reviewed. The purpose of the guidance is to assist practitioners in assessing the seriousness and level of risk associated with a safeguarding adults concern.

It is primarily for use by Safeguarding Adults Managers, in the Local Authority (LA), to assist with their decision-making at the point of receiving a safeguarding adults concern; however others may find it helpful to refer to this guidance when responding to a concern of abuse or neglect.

The new updated guidance reminds practitioners that regular low level concerns (including different types of abuse occurring at the same time) can amount to a far higher level of concern which then requires more in-depth investigation or assessment in line with safeguarding adults procedures. The sharing of low level concerns helps the LA to understand any emerging

patterns or trends that may need to be taken into consideration when deciding whether safeguarding adults procedures need to continue.

The guidance is not intended to replace professional judgement and when care providers are using this guidance, it is important to note that all safeguarding concerns must be notified to the Local Authority.



Deaf Awareness Week 2024

Deaf Awareness Week took place between 6th-10th May. We are reminding everyone that British Sign Language (BSL) users can now use SignLive to contact Cleveland Police when it's not an emergency. It is used like the 101 non-emergency telephone number, to report crimes or incidents which have happened in the past, or for providing information to the police about issues affecting communities.



SignLive is a free service that will connect callers to a qualified online BSL interpreter. The interpreter will relay the conversation between the caller and Cleveland Police, helping them to report a crime or incident in an accessible way.

We have also refreshed our Deaf Awareness Poster.

A Spotlight on Carers Week and Elder Abuse Day 10th—14th June

Carers Week is an annual campaign to raise awareness of caring, highlight the challenges unpaid carers face and recognise the contribution they make to families and communities throughout the UK. It also helps people who don't think of themselves as having caring responsibilities to identify as carers and access much-needed support.



A carer is anyone who looks after a family member or friend who has a disability, mental or physical illness, addiction, or who needs extra help as they grow older. It isn't someone who volunteers or is employed to provide support.

The impact of caring on all aspects of life from relationships and health to finances and work can be significant. Whilst many feel that caring is one of the most important things they do, its challenges should not be underestimated. Caring without the right information and support can be tough. It is vitally important that we recognise the contribution carers make to their families and local communities, workplaces and society, and that they get the support they need.

Carers Assessments

A carer's assessment is a free assessment for carers over 18 years old who provides regular unpaid care to another adult over 18 years old. Any carer who appears to have needs for support can have an assessment which will be carried out by the local adult social care team. This process is not an assessment of a person's capabilities as a carer, it is an opportunity to record the impact of caring and what support or services are required to help make life easier as a carer. Sometimes the support can be as simple as having a chat to understand from the carer how they are feeling and the support they require.

Carers and Safeguarding

Carers have a range of roles regarding safeguarding – they can be the person who raises the concern, be vulnerable to harm and abuse themselves, or they can be abusers.

TSAB have developed two new posters, with the support of carers, to raise awareness of Safeguarding and how carers can access support. To get involved in the campaign, please share and print the posters. They can be found in Carers Week & Elder Abuse Day Campaign Resources.


